LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

In the spirit and intent of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's recommendations, Nightwood Theatre acknowledges the land on which our work is created and where our offices are located is the traditional territory of many Nations, including the Mississaugas of the Credit, the Anishnabeg, the Chippewa, the Haudenosaunee, and the Wendat peoples, and is home to many diverse First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples.

We acknowledge them and any other Nations who care for the land (acknowledged and unacknowledged, recorded and unrecorded) as the past, present, and future caretakers of this land, the traditional territory named Tkarón:to, the Mohawk word for "the place in the water where the trees are standing." DIRECTOR'S NOTE

In January 2020, Maddie and Deanna invited me to collaborate on *Love You Wrong Time*; an idea they'd been returning to since their art-ship was born in 2017. I was delighted. I'd been an audience member at an early iteration, at the Feminist Fuck-It Fest, and came home giddy with the clarity of why I make live performance. I felt full, curious, moved, reflective—and like I'd just been given a really great time. They were smart, funny, virtuostic, and onto something meaningful.

We all know what happened after January 2020—and Love You Wrong Time took a ride on the online pony, like so many other artistic projects. While I will forever hold dear the moment in our one-night-only 'broadcast from the bedroom sleep-over edition' where Maddie straddled her pillows and rode them like a yellow fever afflicted cowboy, this show taught me for the second time about the magic of being in a room together with other people. We decided to wait to host you live, here and now. To look Asian fetishism in the eye, person-to-person in a room together, and to share some catharsis, laughter, joy and reckoning. This show is the embodiment of a friendship "founded on aesthetic principles," and lived experience generously shared.

Maddie Bautista - Creator, Composer, and Performer (she/her)

In the daytime, you can catch Maddie creating and shaping sound in iconic theatres across the country – from composing original music in the earliest stages of new work development, to tuning systems with live musicians and mid-sized casts.

Her composition work takes herself and listeners across the bounds of genre and form. Her hands are dirty with the creation of new performance work, such as Noche Buena with Jennifer Villaverde -- a Filipino-Canadian Christmas musical, and this show you are seeing tonight.

After the sun goes down, she moonlights as half of xLq – a queer pop performance duo who tours across the country with their daring, interactive theatre... and bizarre, grungy drag.

Over the last 10 years Jeremy has been involved in still photography, film, AR, projection, and sound works that ask unanswerable questions contending with, and relevant to, living in this world today - with all that is broken. From a film delving into the impossibility of acquiring a culture, to performance works exploring loss, the limits of memory, the inherent generational difference relative to lived experience, and the irreversible human impact on the natural world, these collaborations have sought to have their audiences consider deeply a vast constellation of unknowns. In looking at what we don't have answers to, perhaps we can ask ourselves more honestly to be where we are. Maybe in seeing what is broken we can see more clearly what can be different, and what can change.

Helen Yung is an inter/transdisciplinary artist. She has designed set, costumes, installations and spaces for the Düsseldorf Schauspielhaus, Buddies in Bad Times Theatre, the red light district theatre company, Open Heart Surgery Theatre Company, The Independent Aunties, Stand Up Dance, Dreamwalker Dance Company, TO Dance Community Love-In, and the Storm &nd Stress Company.
