LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

In the spirit and intent of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's recommendations, Nightwood Theatre acknowledges the land on which our work is created and where our offices are located is the traditional territory of many Nations, including the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation, the Anishnabeg, the Chippewa, the Haudenosaunee, and the Wendat peoples, and is home to many diverse First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples.

We acknowledge them and any other Nations who care for the land (acknowledged and unacknowledged, recorded and unrecorded) as the past, present, and future caretakers of this land, the traditional territory named Tkarón:to, the Mohawk word for "the place in the water where the trees are standing." The treaty for this particular parcel of land (Treaty 13), collectively referred to as the Toronto Purchase, applies to lands east of Brown's Line to Woodbine Avenue and north towards Newmarket.

We recognize the enduring presence of Indigenous peoples on this land. We commit ourselves to addressing and disrupting the systems of oppression and the colonial forces that undermine, distort, or erase the vital role of Indigenous peoples, as is the spirit of the Dish With One Spoon Wampum agreements.

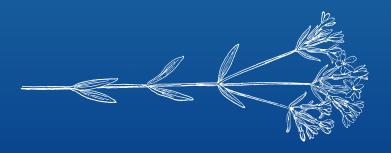

MAGNUS IS EATING BIRDS

BY BECK LLOYD

Directed by **Christine Horne**Performed by **Andrew Broderick, Andre Sills,** and **Brefny Caribou**Stage Directions read by **Zoe Marín**

Magnus is Eating Birds is a new play that blends myth and domestic realism into a gothic family fable. It begins with a mythic union between a man and a woman, where silence and power take root. From this origin, a son, Magnus, emerges into a troubled household where cycles of harm repeat. Through shifting tones, sometimes poetic, sometimes naturalistic, the play explores inheritance, silence, and the impossibility of fully breaking from the past without understanding it.

Content Warning: Family violence (verbal, emotional, implied physical)
Symbolic depictions of harm toward women (represented as birds, not onstage)
Themes of silence, coercion, and intergenerational trauma



BECK LLOYD (SHE/HER) - PLAYWRIGHT

Beck Lloyd holds an MFA in Performance from York University, she teaches acting, text, and Shakespeare across Ontario, and is a graduate of the Birmingham Conservatory for Classical Theatre. Beck writes because she is interested in the use of story creation as a radically inclusive art form creating pathways for critically engaged communities. Living in Toronto where she was born and raised, Beck works as an actor, educator, and part-time playwright.



CHRISTINE HORNE (SHE/HER) - DIRECTOR

Christine's most recent stage credits include Tiff'ny of Athens (Shakespeare in the Ruff), Wicked Nix (YPT), Infinite Life (Coal Mine), Angels in America (That Theatre Company / Buddies), Richard Three (Ruff), Things I Know To Be True (Company Theatre / Mirvish), Three Sisters (Howland Co.), Light (Tarragon), and the title role in Prince Hamlet (Why Not Theatre). She has worked as an assistant director for Ravi Jain, Eda Holmes, and Chris Abraham, and participated in the Langham Director's Workshop at the Stratford Festival in 2021. As a writer she co-adapted Tiffn'y of Athens with Nathaniel Hanula-James (Ruff) and R+I with Ravi Jain and Alex Bulmer (Stratford), and has contributed personal essays, interviews, and memorials for Intermission Magazine and CBCArts. Christine is a member of the Collective Artistic Leadership at Shakespeare in the Ruff. She has received a Dora Award, a Canadian Screen Award, and the Birks Diamond Tribute to Women in Film.

JANELLE COOPER (SHE/HER) - Mom

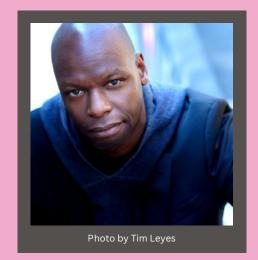

AUTUMN DAVIS (SHE/HER) – STAGE DIRECTIONS READER

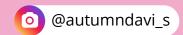

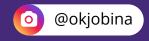

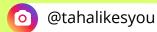

In August 1972, as Idi Amin begins his expulsion of South Asians from the country, two sisters - Chitra and Nishi - meet in the dead of night along the Ugandan-Kenyan border. Unable to cross the border to safety with her sister, Nishi entrusts Chitra with Kasuku, an African Gray Parrot the sisters have cared for since their teenage years. Kasuku becomes a constant companion as Chitra raises her twin children - Priya and Pravesh - in Kenya.

As Priya and Pravesh grow, tensions from the expulsion spread across East Africa. They learn to navigate the shifting relationships of the Native African and Indo-African communities. Meanwhile, Chitra struggles to understand her children as both seek to step outside of their expected paths. Their greatest challenge arises when the family is thrown headfirst into the violent Coup D'etat of August 1982 and its aftermath. The world shifts rapidly around them, and sacrifices must be made or they risk being separated forever.

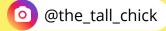

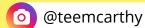

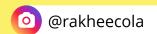

Rachel Cairns mixes data and drama to present an autobiographical work that dares to publicly talk about abortion the way we do privately — with neurotic vulnerability, unflinching honesty, and frank irreverence.

Hypothetical Baby was recently produced by Nightwood Theatre, in association with The Howland Company, as part of our 2024-25 Season

Rachel Carins (she/her) has acted in (and occasionally directed) plays for over a decade, but *Hypothetical Baby* marks the first time she's performing one that she has written. She's appeared on some of Toronto's top stages, including Tarragon, Canadian Stage, and Crow's Theatre. As a writer and director, her web series *Mom & Me* has amassed over seven million views on YouTube.

Rachel is also the creator and host of *Aborsh*, a podcast that explores why abortion is such a "big deal," what "choice" really means, and why that answer is different for different people. Season one received Planned Parenthood Toronto's Choice Award for advocacy in sexual and reproductive health. Season two launched in January 2025 and you can listen to it wherever you get your podcasts. She's currently adapting *Hypothetical Baby* into a memoir with ECW Press.

After accidently locking a nun in the bathroom of their crappy student apartment, three friends attempt to turn the accident into a poor attempt at social justice by demanding the nun apologize on behalf of the Catholic Church. Meanwhile, the trio spiral into a crisis of their own secrets, and misdeeds, which uncomfortably begin to mirror the very acts they are asking The Church to apologize for.

Chelsea Woolley (she/her) is a playwright whose work includes: Enormity, Girl, and the Earthquake in Her Lungs (Nightwood Theatre), Paint Me This House of Love (Tarragon Theatre), The Mountain (Geordie Theatre), and The Only Good Boy (Theatre BSMT). Her writing has been featured at the Kennedy Centre in Washington D.C., and at the "Shakespeare is Dead" Festival in Belgium. She is the founder of the Mixed-Arts Performance Partnership Program connecting young artists living in precarity to professional mentorship, and co-wrote a script titled, One Day with teens at Red Door Shelter.

Chelsea has directed a number of operas with the Canadian Children's opera Company, including the upcoming 2026 production of *Alice in Wonderland* at the Harbourfront Centre. She is the 2025 Tarragon Theatre Bulmash-Siegel New Creation Development Residency Award recipient, and is a graduate of the National Theatre School of Canada's Playwriting Program.
